Types of Dyes. Natural dye materials that produce durable, strong colors and do not require the addition of other substances to obtain the desired outcome are called substantive or direct dyes. Sumac (*Rhus* spp.) and walnut (*Juglans* spp.) are native plant examples of direct dyes. Because these species are high in tannic acid, they do not require additional substances to be added for the dye to attach to fibers and form a durable bond.

### **Native Plant Dyes - US Forest Service**

Remove the flower stalks (these can be composted) and take off about 2.5cm of the current year's foliage growth, which can be used for dyeing. Growth that's harvested during the summer months usually produces a grey dye; leaves collected from early

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spring growth normally produces beige and light brown dyes.

Madder: Historically, madder, obtained from the roots of a madder plant, was widely used throughout the 19th century to create ruby reds. These plants were dug up, washed, dried, and ground into powder. Most fabrics during this time had been dyed with madder.

## **Making Natural Dyes from Plants - Pioneer Thinking**

Natural color obtained from plants such as indigo requires a

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special fermenting process which is referred to as vat dye. Here's where some dyes can cross over into two categories. Indigo, for instance, is a substantive dye; therefore, fibers don't need a separate mordant to hold the color.
